#### Health Minister Adrian Dix visits Prince Rupert

Health Minister Adrian Dix engaged staff, physicians, paramedics, and members of the community in Prince Rupert at the end of March. He has been listening to concerns and working on solutions to stabilize staffing at that Prince Rupert emergency department to help ensure sustainable and high-quality health care in the community.

We are committed to supporting this important hospital and working with the Ministry of Health to make every effort to strengthen staffing, actively recruit to fill vacancies, and prevent emergency department closures wherever possible.

#### Premier David Eby visits new hospital and Seven Sisters in Terrace

BC Premier David Eby took time out of his busy schedule on March 15 to visit the new hospital and new Seven Sisters in Terrace. Northern Health representatives, including Board Chair Colleen Nyce, were pleased to have the chance to discuss the future of health care in Northwest BC with the Premier. #### Improved dementia care coming to Kitimat

Residents and seniors in Kitimat and Kitamaat Village area will soon have access to highquality dementia care at a new long-term care (LTC) home being developed at 100 Loganberry Ave.

"People want the best care for their loved ones in the community they live," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "This is especially true when it comes to stressful diagnoses, such as Alzheimer's or another form of dementia. # Upgraded medical imaging services for the Dawson Creek & District Hospital

The Dawson Creek & District Hospital (DCDH) recently received an upgrade to its medical imaging services with the replacement of one of its two X-ray machines.

The old X-ray machine was a Canon Radrex-i model, installed in February 2013. It was outdated and was becoming difficult to operate due to maintenance issues and the need to replace parts. The new machine is a Carestream Evolution, which features improved image quality, increased reliability, and shorter downtimes, leading to shorter wait times for patients. Read more.

#### Dawson Creek & District Hospital (DCDH) Replacement Project Update

In early-March, Graham Design Builders submitted the 95% design to Northern Health and hosted the <u>third round of mock-ups inside the Quonset hut</u> on the current hospital's property. Mock-up #3 consisted of two fully constructed inpatient rooms including sample materials and finishes, millwork locations, and some equipment and furniture. Leadership representatives were invited to experience key features of the design and provide feedback and input on design decisions.

Representatives from the DCDH project team and Northern Health Recruitment have been out in the community attending local events! Recently, they spent the day at <u>Saulteau First Nations</u> annual education, jobs, and career fair and at <u>Dawson Creek Secondary School's annual</u> <u>career fair</u>. Getting involved with these local events gives us the opportunity to share information about the DCDH Project and engage with potential future health care professionals about job opportunities and career paths with Northern Health.

### **Overdose prevention and response**

#### Toxic Drug Alert: Terrace – March 20, 2024

There has been an increase in drug poisoning/overdose events in Terrace. Overdoses have been linked to smoking a purple substance sold as "down" causing prolonged sedation and requiring many doses of Naloxone to reverse.

Take care, drugs move throughout the North, please share this alert widely. We have included <u>safety recommendations on our website</u>.

#### Text alerts for toxic drugs available in the North

In response to the toxic drug emergency, a text message alert system was launched across Northern Health. The system sends text alerts with timely information and up-to-date resources to people who use drugs, those who support them, and community members.
