COVID-19 case counts and statements

As of February 23, **4,417** cases have been reported in the NH region since the beginning of the pandemic.

- Cases currently active: 305
- New cases: 66
- Currently in hospital: 41
 - Currently admitted to HAU/ICU in hospital: 12
- Deaths in the NH region since the beginning of the pandemic: 104

Overdose prevention and response

Reflecting on the overdose crisis in 2020

As the five-year anniversary of the province's illicit drug toxicity public health emergency approaches, the BC Coroners Service reports 2020 was B.C.'s worst year yet in terms of number of lives lost due to the effects of the toxic illicit drugs.

BC had 1,716 deaths due to illicit drugs in 2020, a 74% increase over 2019 (984). The number of deaths in 2020 equates to 4.7 preventable deaths every day, and is two deaths per day higher than in 2019 (2.7). This toxic drug supply has claimed more lives than motor vehicle crashes, homicides, suicides, and prescription-drug-related deaths combined.

In Northern Health we must continue working to keep people who use drugs safer. Resources to help staff, clients, and families stay safer:

Sign up for the Health Career Access Program: A paid education opportunity to become a Registered Health Care Assistant

The new Health Career Access Program (HCAP) gives you the opportunity to receive paid education and on-the-job training to become a registered Health Care Assistant. Your course fees will be covered, and you'll also be paid for your time while you study and work.

The program consists of employment, education, and training, and takes up to 18 months to finish.

Overview:

Successful applicants must meet both Northern Health's job requirements and the requirements of the college they'll attend. Which college you attend depends on where you live.

After finishing your education to become a health care assistant, you'll start as a health care support worker before moving on to a health care assistant position.

- Health care support workers earn a starting salary of about \$39,000.
- Health care assistants earn an average annual salary of about \$45,090.

The HCAP process

1. Complete an <u>expression of interest form</u>. Your information is collected through the Ministry of Health, which shares it with Northern Health.

2. A Northern Health representative will contact you to encourage you to create a profile on Northern Health and submit your resume. Once you have been short-listed, a Northern Health representative will contact you about next steps.

On completion of the program, you earn a recognized post-secondary credential and are eligible to register as a health care assistant.
