COVID-19

COVID-19 orders - Province strengthens COVID-19 measures for safer holiday season

The provincial health officer has implemented additional measures to address rising COVID-19 case counts that could result in increased hospitalizations and critical care admissions and the potential to overstress the health-care system.

Revised provincial health orders took effect on Wednesday, December 22, 2021 at 11:59 pm.

The restrictions will extend to January 18, 2022 at 11:59 pm, and include:

- No organized indoor social events and gatherings of any size;
- Concerts, sports games and theatres reduced to 50% seating capacity, regardless of venue size;
- Closing gyms, fitness centres and dance studios;
- Closing bars and nightclubs; and
- Limiting table sizes at restaurants, cafes and pubs to a maximum of six people per table with physical distancing or barriers.

These provincial orders are applicable to all of British Columbia, while the Northern Health region also has NH-specific public health orders on Gatherings and Events. For more information, please see:

COVID-19 immunization plan

Pediatric dose

The Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine is now available for children 5 to 11. This vaccine uses a lower dose (10 micrograms), at one-third of the dose formulated for older children and adults, which will provide effective protection tailored to children's immune systems. The National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) advises that children receive a two-dose series of the vaccine with an interval of eight weeks or more between the first and second dose.

Third dose

The third dose of the COVID-19 vaccination is for some people who are moderately to severely immunocompromised. People who need a third dose <u>will be contacted</u> by the provincial <u>Get</u> <u>Vaccinated</u> system.

Booster dose

The booster dose is an additional non-urgent, non-compulsory vaccine that gets immunity back up to a desirable level of protection for an extended period of time. It will be available starting in January 2022.

To book a booster dose, please ensure you're registered in the <u>Get Vaccinated</u> system. If you have difficulty accessing online booking, please call 1-833-838-2323.

Please note that pediatric, third, and booster doses may be by appointment only, not walk-ins. Please see the <u>Northern Health COVID-19 immunization clinic page</u> for more information for your community.

COVID-19 vaccines in BC pharmacies

BC's community pharmacies will play a major role in delivering (mRNA) COVID-19 vaccinations to eligible British Columbians. As of December 14, 2021, community pharmacies in 80 communities are taking appointments for individuals 12 and older. These vaccinations will be by appointment only. Register and book through the province's <u>Get Vaccinated system</u>.

Pharmacies are not providing COVID-19 vaccinations to children ages 5 to 11. For more information, visit the Province of BC's <u>website</u>.

Order of Canada award recognizes Dr. Margo Greenwood's lifetime commitment to transforming the health and well-being of Indigenous children and families

Dr. Margo Greenwood, an Indigenous scholar of Cree ancestry, has worked for over 30 years to transform the health and well-being of Indigenous children, families, and communities. Her work creates a more just and equitable Canada.

Dr. Greenwood is now being recognized with one of the highest honours in the land.

On December 29, 2021, Her Excellency the Right Honourable Mary Simon, Governor General of Canada, announced the appointment of Dr. Margo Greenwood as an Officer of the Order of Canada (O.C.). This award acknowledges Dr. Greenwood's outstanding leadership and contributions to society.

Dr. Greenwood is the Academic Leader of the National Collaborating Centre for Indigenous Health, housed at the University of Northern British Columbia. She is a Professor in UNBC's First Nations Studies and Education programs. Dr. Greenwood has served as Vice President of Indigenous Health, Northern Health since 2013. For 15 years, she has contributed to the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. Dr. Greenwood was Advisory Board Chair for the Institute of Aboriginal Peoples' Health from 2006-2013. She is currently a member of the Institute of Population and Public Health Advisory Board.

Cultural Safety and Humility technical committee reviewing feedback from across Canada

<u>Health Standards Organization (HSO)</u> has received over 1,100 comments from 155 individuals and organizations on the draft *British Columbia* (*B.C.*) *First Nations, Métis and Inuit Cultural Safety and Humility* standard (HSO 75000:2021 E Cultural Safety and Humility BC). The development of this standard was driven by a First Nations-led technical committee and supported by the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA), with additional input from Métis Nation BC.

It aims to help create a culturally safe environment in the health system, encourage health care providers to provide care with humility, and end Indigenous-specific racism.

The final standard, which will be published in 2022, will be a guiding resource that supports systems and organizations in addressing Indigenous-specific racism and building an accessible, respectful and culturally safe environment for Indigenous people as they interact with the health system.
